

Fishing On The White River

"Tonight I'm going to show you some of the access points along the White River," said Todd Schotts, MFFC member and November's speaker. The river is 23 miles long, houses 253 miles of streams, covers three counties (Newaygo, Oceana and Muskegon), is 95% swamps and bogs, then eventually discharges into Lake Michigan. "It is stocked with browns from White Cloud to Hesperia. The head waters are hard to access as there is much private property, along with the bogs and swamps," said Schotts.

Bears reside up around 6 Mile Road, the first access point Schotts suggests. "South of Six Mile Road to VanBuren...is at least a 12 hour wade," said Schotts. "The time to fish this is at the beginning of spring. There are trout hotels in there."

At VanBuren Street, there is alot of private property. "They will kick you out, and there are no longer any access points at Jackson. You must go to Three Mile Road," said Schotts.

From 3 Mile Road, "You can wade to Monroe street; there is very thick cover."

Monroe Street (Old M-20) offers wading. "It is actually very good fishing down to Two Mile Road, most of it is gravel. It's all high sticking, no casting," said Schotts.

At 2 Mile Road, "This is where I see alot of the bears. Coyotes. You can hear them," Schotts added, "There are some weird sounds I have never heard before in that area after dark." Farther down that trek,



"The bridge is gone. It was washed out and was never built again. There are Browns and Brook Trout in there." This stretch sports tons of over hanging branches, root systems, and cover providing river structure and debris for hiding.

Lake White Cloud (Mill Pond), "Fish at the spillway," said Schotts. "There are Brookies in the park. Fish below the railroad bridge....but do NOT get underneath that bridge when a train comes through, you can't hear for two days...it really rumbles around in there!"

Around 37, "We caught little Rainbows there," said Schotts, "down below the bridge."

As an aside, Schotts advises taking time to visit The Flowing Well. "The board tells *Continued on Page 2*

Continued from Page 1 the history of how they wanted to build a hotel there, put dynamite into the rock, and water has flowed ever since."

Another point of access is North Country Trail, a mountain bike trail. Then at Rattlesnake Creek - "There are some great fish back there but you get into some nasty crap," said Schotts.

Baldwin Avenue, "When it rains, it comes up fast here, south of 20. You do alot of walking. I do alot of dry fly fishing back in this area."

M20 Roadside Park, "This has some nice Brook Trout and nice Browns in there too. We actually ran into a bear back there too," said Schotts.

Luce Avenue to Warner Avenue section, "This is my favorite spot," Schotts said enthusiastically. Todd's uncle used to own much of the river access, so he is extremely familiar with this section. "To access the White at Luce Avenue, go across the bridge and park on Two Mile Road, just off Luce." He advises, "From Warner, you need a four wheel drive. Watch out for the dog by the road too. It is a seasonal road; they do not take care of this road."

It is a very bendy passage once in the river. "Stay next to the bank. It's really deep. There are usually fish in there." This is the stretch of river where everything is always "around the next bend."

"Black Wing Caddis and Blue Wing Olives are big players in that area." This section is a five hour wade, 12 if you have someone new with you. "It is all private on both sides so you can't get out of the river."

Next, Schotts showed where to find the big runs, deep pools and good riffles.

At Warner Avenue, there are no access points until Grossback or Green Roads.

At Green Road, the river widens then narrows

Schotts provided a list of items so as to come prepared,"For gear I suggest a three or four weight rod, 6x or 7x tippet, and definitely a wading staff." Streamers? Anything Wooly Bugger. Flies? Borchers', Adam's Post, Caddis', : Mr. Perfect.... Nymphs? Pheasant Tail, Zug Bugs, Compton's BWO Jig, Prince Nymphs....

Get in touch with Schotts for a full list of fly shops and food establishments. Schotts mentioned Hesperia Sport Shop, Muskegon : River Fly Shop in Newaygo, and Great Lakes Fly Shop. For the latter, he spoke highly of Daniel's Restaurant and very enthusiastically said, "The BP station in Hespira has some of the : best broasted chicken ever!"

His parting advice was to point out that due to the conditions, there is no canoe traffic in the stream area, and very little on the lake...but "Watch out for bobcats, coyotes, bears, and up in the headwaters - cougars."

N ovember Fly Of The Month

A Solid Fast Water Fly

Humpy Variations

While pondering which fly I should bring out this month, a friend of mine down in Tennessee called asking if I had any Humpy Flies in stock. It then dawned on me...of course! Why not make November Humpy Fly month?!

The history for this fly is as tangled as those nasty wind knots that occur in your tippets, leaders, and fly lines. For many historians (yes there is historians for the history of flies), they believe the fly was hatched during the early 1940's by California Fly Tyer, Jack Horner. The original name was Horner's Deer Hair Fly. Now this is where it gets twisted and even more knotted; a similar fly was also hatched at the same time in Canada called Tom Thumb. Once these patterns made their way to the Rocky Mountain region, it was referred to as the Goofus Bug. In the late 1940's the term "Humpy" was attached to the fly within the regions of Jackson Hole, Wyoming where the name branded the fly and stuck. The final name was thought to be brought about by Boots Allen, the owner of a small fly shop in Jackson Hole. This fly was actually popularized by Jack Dennis in his Western Trout Fly Tying Manual.

The ingredients that make this fly one of the most successful attractor flies is the deer/ elk hair, creating its large appearance and its amazing floatability. But with all of its success, the fear a lot of fly tyers have is that this fly is one of the hardest flies to tie. There are a so many variations which makee the family of Humpy's well branched. The most popular version is probably the Yellow Humpy, then you have Royal Humpy, Adam's Humpy, Elk Hair Humpy, the Black Humpy, and the unique Double Humpy. The Double Humpy was actually a mistake at the vise by Joe Allen, son of Boots Allen in 1981. But the mistake ended up working out great, so it became yet another version of the original pattern. And we cannot forget about the crazy family member, the "Foam Humpy."

However you tie this unique, albeit difficult pattern, it will be glorious. The replacement of the deer hair by elk hair for the: wing and hump was made popular by Jack Dennis back in the early 1960's. Whatever hair you decide to use, make sure you pick hair that doesn't flair to much. Look for early season or early summer patches of hair. Back when they tied the original pattern, the same patch of hair was used for the hump and the wing. Tying it that way, your wings would have been short or oversize, fly not staying upright, and it just caused a lot of issues amongst tyers. Many tyers now do this with two patches of hair, one for the hump and one for the wing.

The main thing that made these flies so popular is that they work well in big fast waters. You can fish this fly alone, or use it as top fly tying a dropper on to it. However you fish or tie this fly, if you are in fast waters in Michigan, out West, or down in the Mountains of Tennessee, this fly will bring you many tight lines. THREAD: 8/0 or 70 denier color to match body (yellow or chartreuse are the most successful ones)

WING: Deer or Elk


