### Time to Get Mystified

Our April speaker meeting brought us a very good friend of the club, Dennis Klein from Mystic Rods - amazing, unique, and awesome. Klein got started when he was 11 years old building his very first fly rod. With this type of craftsmanship and knowledge, I was pretty excited when Dennis coming to our club to talk on "What Makes a Great Fly Rod." This is something all of us can gain knowledge from that will help in the future.

Mystic Rods is located in Portland, Michigan between some of the best smallmouth fishing areas; they are situated between the Grand and Looking Glass Rivers. The company was founded in 2005 and has been very successful. Their design is top of the line, with excellence in rod tapers, double locking reel seats, high grade reel seats, high grade cork handles, and a very high level of craftsmanship.

The night was a learning experience as to what to look for in a fly rod. We heard about snake guides, stripper guides, cork with little voids, the three things you want to look for when purchasing a fly rod, and how to gauge different rod actions.

The first three things you want to look for when purchasing a fly rod are: (1) casting, (2) line control, and (3) striking or landing a fish. For casting, if you have a good fly rod and a good combination of casting skill you will be able to lay the fly down without spooking the fish. The next big function of a fly rod is line control. This happens once the fly is presented to the fish on the water, it is how you are able to control the fly as it is floating (dry fly) or sinking (streamer, wet fly, or nymph). The last thing you need to consider is the striking or landing of a fish.


Your fly rod is used to both set the hook and to fight/land the fish. The rod needs to be flexible and strong enough to bend under great pressure without breaking. However, there are always those unfortunate moments when a fly rod meets with a car door, ceiling fan, your foot, etc.

The next three areas of concern to look for when purchasing rods should be the three types of fly rod actions. The three actions are: (1) fast action or tip-flex fly rods, (2) medium action or mid-flex fly rods, and (3) slow action or full-flex fly rods. The action refers to the flexibility of the rod. If you take the fast action rod, the stiffness of the rod allows for more power. For example, fishing on a windy day you would have to work less to cast the same distance as with a slow action rod. The medium action rods are probably the most versatile. They have a lot of great factors. For example, they are easier to learn to fish with and perform in a wide variety of conditions. The slow action rods are very flexible. The best places for a slow action rod is on a small stream. But remember, pick out the action that best fits your level of casting, and how it feels when you cast. Not all actions are suitable for everyone.

With these six basic things to look for when you are interested in purchasing a new fly rod, you will be on the correct path for great rewards in casting, presenting your fly, and landing that fish of a life time. Thanks Dennis for taking the time to come to our club and mystifying us with all this great fly rod information.



She also brought her two workers from the calendar company – Karen and Carol – two country girls who couldn't wait to come to this show and get off their farms for a few days. A gang of us found a great bar in Aurora, Colorado where the gathering crowd on a Saturday night was at least thirty-five years old and the disc jockey played great old rock-n-roll songs. He always


