The MFFC Youth School Preps The Next Generation

On Saturday, May 6, 2017, 36 folks gathered at MSU Tollgate for the 2017 MFFC Youth School. There were five returning students and eight new students eager to learn on this windy, but sunny day. Seventeen MFFC members volunteered their time that day to instruct, mentor, and encourage the youth.

The day began with Len Dixon's overview of fly fishing, including developing a respect for the land and bodies of water on which one fishes, and sharing some ideas of books and resources that would make good gift ideas. This introduction was followed by Entomology Expert Spencer Vanderhoof, who had the rapt attention of all the youth as he gathered them around his table to share his knowledge of "all things bugs" - what fish eat.

Next up, Terry Herron shared his wealth of knowledge about fly tying. Again, the youth gathered around, as they learned fly tying techniques "from hook to fly." What a treat for them to watch Master Fly Tyer Herron tie both a Woolly Bugger and a Soft Hackle. The youth then moved back to their seats next to their mentors and, with

mentor assistance, tied the same two flies.

The fishing equipment portion of the program, featured MFFC's very own The Mike and Mike Show. Mike Harrington and Mike Miller educated and entertained the youth (and mentors) as they bantered back and forth describing all the necessary equipment to be a true fly fisherman, all while totally dressing Mike Miller in said gear.

The youth moved on, with mentor assistance and instruction by Mike Harrington, to learn several knots necessary for successful fishing. They learned the double surgeon's knot, clinch knot, and how to use a loop-to-loop connection.

The safety portion of the program was covered by Len Dixon. Then Mike Miller led the rod and reel assembly part of the day.

For the culmination of this fly fishing day, everyone headed outdoors into the wind to learn casting techniques. There was much excitement as these young, now full of knowledge, new fly fishing youth actually headed to the pond to catch fish. At the end of the day, there were already fishing stories being told. A Historical Perspective

The Michigan Fly Fishing Club Origins:

After the 2nd meeting of the organization (yet to be named) in January of 1970, the following people stepped forward to "get this group off the ground"...... Wil Foreman Carl Glotzhober Dick Enger John Pinto Joyce & Warren LeClair Mary & Joseph Spanberger

This group set up the first meeting programs. Elections soon followed with the following people being elected these positions.....

Wil Foreman	President
Carl Glotzhober	Vice President
Dick Enger	Secretary
John Pinto	Treasurer

These were the only elected positions. The LeClairs and the Spanbergers were "in the loop" helping plan events, meetings, etc.

Will, Foreman, Carl Glotzhober, Dick Enger, and John Pinto traded club positions several times over the next four to five years.

John Pinto nominated the club's name and designed the club patch/logo. The First Constitution was written by Carl Glotzhober, Dick Enger and John Pinto in the basement of **John Pinto's** home.

In the spring of 1972 the club, with 65 members and a treasury of \$600, started the Huron River Project. They paid over \$400 for the initial planting of trout. (This activity was taken over by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and is now celebrated by Michigan Fly Fishing Club members each year as the Trout Tune-Up).

This project was written up in the Detroit News by James A.O. Crowe and by May 1972 the club soon had 150 members and a treasury of over \$1500. The MFFC continued to grow by double digits each year for the next ten years.

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Get Out & Get Fishing

My calendar tells me it's about 350 days until opening day 2018.

That sounds like a long time, but it will go fast if you spend your summer and fall doing what we all love - fly fishing. The wonderful thing is that all the trout streams in the State of Michigan are now open for fishing, and it won't be long until the streams that offer Smallmouth Bass will be open too. So it's time to make some plans and get out and fish.

Our club offers some wonderful chances to share time with others, fish some great spots, and learn more about our shared sport. Between the Dick Schott New Members outing and the Smallmouth Bass outing there are lots of opportunities to learn new techniques, find new flies, meet new fishing buddies and maybe share some special information with new folks. Sometimes the best experiences are those we share with folks just getting into our sport.

Now is the time to plan some fishing trips for this year. Don't limit yourself to some of the same streams you have fished before. Sometimes the best fishing is on new streams mentoring me when I first joined our club. with new possibilities and new areas to explore. Rusty Gates loved to comment that some of the best fishing is to be found by looking at a map and following the blue lines. The smaller the better. So get out a map and look at all those small blue lines. Do some exploring; ask around a bit. I often feel the best streams are those that don't get all the pressure of the famous streams. Streams that are smaller than twenty feet

; wide are perfect for small fly rods and I can ; promise you that the fish that live there don't : see many flies floating over their heads. They are very friendly and will love your poorly presented fly much more that the picky fish of the famous streams. Fishing smaller streams can also teach us some new casting techniques as there are normally some close hanging tree limbs to watch for. Again, learning new things is always beneficial, and pays big dividends on other streams. So find those small blue lines and explore some new streams this summer.

Of course there are still lots of fun fishing : times to be had on the more well known streams. So look into some new access points, ask other club members to show you some spots they enjoy, and again, look at the small blue lines on a map. All of our larger streams have numerous smaller feeder streams and those often hold some surprisingly nice fish. These smaller feeder streams frequently have cooler water temps than the large streams which means happy healthy fish to catch. And again, less fishing pressure means fish that are much more friendly to our poorly cast flies. With an entire season of hatching bugs before us there are plenty of opportunities to find and enjoy new fishing spots for us all.

I have always considered one of the best things of our club to be that we all have the chance to share information, experiences, and stories with new members. I remember fondly having more senior members sort of Between ideas for tying flies that caught fish, small access points on some of the streams, and just plain fishing techniques and information, I learned a lot during my first years in our club. I know I am not alone in this fact, and I know that it's important to 'pay it forward' with new members. This 'pay it forward' is also an opportunity to learn from the new folks. I have shared spots with some new members, and have learned

from them about looking outside the box of what I knew and enjoyed. Fishing with new folks is a learning path both ways and that's a wonderful thing. So get out and fish, with some new folks too.

How about trying some new techniques that don't require wading in a stream. Float tubes are a fun way to explore some of the smaller lakes around our state. Smaller lakes often have restrictions on motor sizes for bigger boats, and for me that means less chance of problems with those boats...and far less noise too. Again, look at those maps and find some off the beaten path small lakes..... Once again, with less pressure these lakes are often a real bonus of fishing possibilities. Not much pressure, no big noisy motors, and lots of space to explore to catch fish. This sounds like a good summer prospect to me. I have found several small lakes that I have enjoyed time and again with fellow MFFC members. The fishing can be awesome, the friendships and shared fun memorable, and the just plain quiet times - very rewarding. So add the float tube to your summer plans and maybe catch the fish of a lifetime on some small lake.

With so many new opportunities ahead, the summer season will rush by so very fast. New friends, new streams and new lakes will make for a wonderful summer fishing season. Make some plans, make some new friends, learn some new places and techniques, and get out there and fish. The summer is flying by already. Get going. Go fishing. And enjoy.

This will be my last commentary for a while. I am taking the summer off to follow my own suggestions. New streams, some new friends, and maybe a new lake or three will take my time away from the keyboard. I am looking forward to hearing stories of new adventures from some of you, and looking forward to my own new adventures too. I shall return, with some adventures to share, in September of this year.
