Planning for the 2010 Dick Schott New Member Outing has begun. We encourage new members to join us **May 5 thru May 8, 2010,** at WaWaSum Lodge. Sign-up sheets will be available at club meetings in February. <u>New club</u> <u>members</u> should return their sheets with a \$135 check made **payable to Paul DeJohn** after completing the club's February Member Fly Fishing School. Staff members can return their sheets and checks at any time – "first come, first served."

"We can only accommodate 25 people and the outing fills fast, so get your sign-ups and money in by the first meeting in March. Remember: "first come, first served."

WaWaSum Lodge is a historic log lodge and teaching facility owned by Michigan State University and sits high above the banks of the AuSable's Holy Water six miles east of Grayling. If you have never visited the lodge, you are truly in for a treat. The most popular feature of the lodge is the large screened porch with bentwood rockers overlooking the river. The great room has a large fieldstone fireplace, ample seating, and an activity area for fly-tying. Guest rooms for your three-night stay accommodate three to four guests each. Three beds on the screened porch will be available to those desiring quiet sleep.

"Cook-ee Mike" and his helpers will provide us with great breakfasts before our morning guided scouting trips, and wholesome lunches before our afternoon and evening of fishing on Thursday and Friday. Unlike outings in the past, dinner will not be served. However, ample food will be available for you to "graze" following your fishing day. You also have the option of dining at one of the local restaurants.

The annual New Member Outing gives attending members an opportunity to visit and fish superior locations along the AuSable. It also provides a venue to become more acquainted with the snoring habits, etc., of your fellow club members. (Ear plugs are recommended.) The outing is not intended to be a fishing school. However, you will indeed receive an education, good food, lots of laughs, and more confidence in your fly-fishing and fly-tying abilities. Good jokes are always welcome.

As indicated above, and new for 2010, new members attending are required to attend the club's February Member Fly Fishing School, and be able to show a safe level of fishing and wading proficiency before being included in the outing. Those new members who join the club after the February Fly Fishing School will be asked to wait to attend the outing the following year after completing the club's school.


"It's another great line-up," said Joe Sprys, Expo Chairman and a past president of the host Michigan Fly Fishing Club. "It's been a number of years since we've had Dave Hughes with us and we're looking forward to seeing him again. Watching Joe Humphreys on the casting pond is mesmerizing. You can't say the word steelhead in Michigan and not think of Bear Andrews. And we feel very fortunate to be able to bring Bob Jacklin back from West Yellowstone, Montana, ... especially after a death in the family cut short his appearance at last year's Expo."

Planning is well-underway for the 2010 Expo, scheduled for March 13-14 at the Macomb Community College Sports and Expo Center in Warren. Look for volunteer sign-up sheets to make their appearance at a club meeting soon, Sprys said.

Dave Hughes

Hughes says he got hooked on the world of fly fishing and trout when he was a teenager growing up in Astoria, OR, where the Columbia River empties into the Pacific Ocean.



Did we mention that Dave Hughes was a prolific author? Here are just a few of his offerings.

"That area abounded in salmon and steelhead and sea-run cutthroat trout to catch, deer and elk and ducks to hunt, clams to dig, a monstrous river and much larger ocean to explore. I sampled all those things, but over time narrowed my few free days to bounding up headwater streams, in pursuit of resident cutthroat trout. Something about the environment in which those trout lived--the sun striking through cathedrals of trees, the beautiful streams that plunged swiftly, then abruptly put on their brakes to pool deeply, the predaceous trout that left their lairs to arise suddenly into sunlight and strike my dry flies-pleased me, and kept me coming back."

Hughes is a prolific and much accomplished author. He has written more than 20 books about fly fishing for trout, his most recent being *Nymphs for Streams & Stillwaters*, published last year. He has also written for such magazines as "Salmon, Trout, Steelheader," "Flyfishing & Tying Journal," "Fly Rod & Reel," "Fly Fisherman," "Field and Stream" and "Gray's Sporting Journal."

Joe Humphreys

Pennsylvania's Joe Humphreys is a nationally known fly fisherman. conservationist, author, and educator, sharing his angling knowledge and expertise for more than 40 years with college students new to the sport as well as a dizzying array of VIPs, including former President Jimmy Carter, Vice President Richard Cheney, basketball coaching legend Bobby Knight and many others. Humphreys is nationally known as one of the foremost educators in angling, having directed the highly regarded angling program at Penn State for 19 vears.

Like Hughes, Humphreys has authored a number of books on the sport. including Trout Tactics and On the *Trout Stream*. In addition, he is a regular contributor to regional and national periodicals including "Fly Fisherman," "Outdoor Life," "Pennsylvania Angler" and "Fly Rod & Reel." He hosted the first national fly fishing series on U.S. television, "Fly Fishing Journal," first broadcast on ESPN. Since then, he has been the featured instructor on a variety of instructional videos, including "A Casting Approach to Nymphing Tactics," "A Casting Approach to Dry Fly Tactics in the Brush," "The Night Game," and "A Casting Approach to Flyfishing to Catch Fish, Not Just to Cast. "

He is especially well-known for his mastery of small stream fishing tactics, which emphasize stealth, patience and tight, accurate casts.

Bob Jacklin

Widely regarded as fly angling's number one ambassador, Bob Jacklin is best known as the proprietor of Jacklin's Fly Shop in the fly fishing mecca of West Yellowstone, MT.

He moved to West Yellowstone in 1967, worked at Bud Lilly's fly shop and opened his own shop in 1974.

He and his shop have been meeting the needs of Yellowstone-area anglers and visitors for more than 35 years. A world class fly angler, fly caster, and fly tier, Bob has taught countless people how to fish and cast with flies. He is a Federation of Fly Fishers founding members, past president (2001-2006) of the Western Rocky Mountain Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers (FFF) and one of FFF's first certified master casters, not to mention one of the finest people and fishermen you could ever meet.

He is a past recipient of the FFF's Buz Buszek Award for his contributions to the art of fly tying and was inducted to the Fly Fishing Hall of Fame in 2004.

In spite of the accolades and fame, a 2005 *Bozeman Chronicle* story said: "Jacklin considers himself a student of fly fishing rather than an expert. He collects antique fishing tackle and literature and is captivated by the romance of the sport he loves. 'As a kid I was caught up in the romance,' he said. 'I remember people in tweed jackets fishing with a tie. My uncle would pick me up at four in the morning and he'd always wear a tie and an old hunting jacket. I remember those things.'"

Jeff "Bear" Andrews

Michigan native Jeff "Bear" Andrews has been fly fishing and tying flies for more than 40 years. From 1977 until 1987, he ran Bear's Fly Shop in Grand Ledge, MI. A year later he was presented the Buz Buszek Memorial Fly Tying Award, the highest honor bestowed upon a fly tier by the FFF. At the time he was the youngest tier to receive this award.

He founded and guided a 10-year run of "Tyathons" for the Federation of Fly Fishers. These 24-hour tying marathons raised more than \$125,000 for the FFF's conservation projects.

While he may be best known for his steelhead patterns and exploits, Bear also loves fishing for big brook trout. He has set three International Game Fish Association (IGFA) world records for the species.

He is currently the Fly Fishing Editor for "Michigan Out-Of-Doors" magazine and pens the magazine's "Michigan Fly Box" column each month, something he has done for nearly 20 years. He also is a pro staff member for Umpqua Feather Merchants, Regal Vise Company and Daiichi Hooks. He spends summers guiding for Fuller's North Branch Outing Club in Lovells, MI.








Christmas comes to the MFFC

Twas the week before Christmas and all through the school MFFCers were making merry -- from a table laden with Christmas cookies to the air filled with sounds of the Trombone Choir of the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham, which includes VP Chris Hunter and Corresponding Secretary Bruce Kramer on tuba, to the dulcet sounds of Al Haxton and the Soft-Hackle Choir with its rendition of "The Club Pin Nazi is Tracking You Down," sung to the tune of "Santa Claus is Coming to Town" to an uproarious takeoff on "The Twelve Days of Christmas," complete with a partridge skin in a pear tree.







Jack Gartside passed away at the age of 66. Jack brought a certain level unorthodoxy to all his pursuits.

Our sport loses another legend: Jack Gartside

Jack Gartside, who is counted as one of the most innovative fly tiers of the modern era, lost his battle with lung cancer last month. He visited our club several times, most recently as the featured presenter at one of our banquets.

A native of Boston, MA, he got his first fly tying lesson in 1956 from Boston Red Sox Hall of Famer Ted Williams. Ever since he's been tying and fishing, accumulating an extraordinary range of fishing experience in fresh and salt water. He was profiled in "Sports Illustrated" magazine (Oct. 12, 1982). Jack's bestknown original patterns include the Gurgler, Sparrow, Soft Hackle Streamer, and the Gartside Pheasant Hopper. His designs have been featured in Eric Leiser's Book of Fly Patterns, Judith Dunham's The Art of the Trout Fly, Lefty Kreh's Salt Water Fly Patterns, Dick Stewart's Salt Water Flies, and Dick Brown's Flyfishing for Bonefish.

His obituary in *The Boston Globe* read, in part:

"Jack Gartside invented some of his much-prized fishing flies while using a vise clasped to the steering wheel of his cab as he sat in Logan Airport's taxi queue, waiting for a fare. Even behind the wheel, Mr. Gartside kept one wader-clad leg planted in the trout streams of Montana, a secluded nook in New Zealand, or a neglected fishing hot spot in Boston Harbor.

"In my high school yearbook, other people listed doctor or lawyer in the space provided for their future job," he told "Field & Stream" magazine in 1999. "I put fishing."

"More than 30 years ago, Mr. Gartside quit teaching high school English to fish more or less full time, living simply and supplementing his fly-tying income by driving a cab or grabbing a temporary job near a fishing destination. Once he helped make caskets; another time, he degreased snowmobile runners.

"Mr. Gartside, who was as well known internationally for his devil-may-care lifestyle as he was for his expertise flyfishing and fly-tying, died of lung cancer Saturday in the Bear Hill Rehabilitation and Nursing Center in Stoneham. He was 66 and had lived in Winthrop after many years in a Mission Hill apartment crammed with books and tools of the fly-tying trade.


"A devotee of trout fishing, Mr. Gartside spent so much time fishing in and near Yellowstone National Park in Wyoming that for a while his car was registered in Montana.

"Then, he logged so many hours in the salt water around Boston that his writings about the best locations became indispensable to those who want to fish the harbor."

Jack is the author of *Striper Flies*, the first book ever specifically written on fly patterns for striped bass. Another book, *Striper Strategies*, is described by reviewer Steve Raymond as: "...one of the most remarkable striper-fishing manuals to see the light of day," and by reviewer Tom Meade as "Blessed with bright writing, keen observations, and the most concise advice a striper hunter can find."

His recent books include Secret Flies for Fresh and Salt Water, The Fly Fisherman's Guide to Boston Harbor, and Scratching the Surface. "Wow," wrote "On the Water" magazine about the Fly Fisherman's Guide to Boston Harbor. "(It's) easily the best guidebook to be found anywhere."

In 2006 Jack published revised and expanded editions of his earlier seminal works *Fly Patterns for the Adventurous Tyer* and *Original Salt Water Fly Patterns*. Other books include *Flies for the 21st Century* and *The Soft Hackle Streamer*.



Rusty Gates passes away

As this edition of The Hatch was going to press, we received word that Rusty Gates lost his battle with lung cancer. He shall be greatly missed – as a friend and conservationist.

"Rusty Gates was possibly the most influential and highly respected fly fishing personality any of us have ever known," said MFFC President Pat Brazzil. "He was a great friend to the men and women of the Michigan Fly Fishing Club. His generosity in allowing us to use his board room to celebrate our Trout Opener Memorial is appreciated. This year's memorial will be especially difficult. I ask all of you to think back memorably about our friend, Rusty and give thought to his amazing contributions to the fly fishing community."

Terry Herron leads off as 2010's first featured tier

The Detroit Tigers might not know who's leading off for them, but we know who's leading off as 2010's first featured tier -- none other than Terry Herron.

You might remember seeing Terry in November 2008 tying two patterns -- a foam hopper and the late Jack Gartside's famous Sparrow pattern. This year, Terry is going to the other end of the fly tying spectrum. Rather than big, meaty morsels, he's focusing on blue-wing olives (BWOs) – spinners and emergers..

If you're unfamiliar with Terry, he is a Royal Oak resident, a retired school teacher, and a very active MFFC member. He's a regular as an instructor at the club's schools, does yeoman's work at our youth fly tying experiences at the annual Ultimate Fishing Show and Outdoorama and organizes the youth tying activity at our Midwest Fly Fishing Expo.

His plan for the Jan. 20 activity meeting is to demonstrate the BWO Spinner and BWO Emerger. So bring your vise, tools and note-taking materials for some hands-on insight from one of our own master tiers.

Here's what you'll need.

BWO SPINNER

Hook: Size 16-20 dry fly hook Thread: 8-0 dun Tail: Dun hackle Abdomen: BWO turkey biot Wingcase: Electronics packing foam Wing: Medium dun high-vis Thorax: BYO dry fly dubbing

BWO EMERGER

Hook: Size 16-20 scud or Emerger Thread: 8-0 dun Tail: Gray Emerger sparkle yarn Body: Turkey biot Wing: Dun CDC Thorax: BWO dry fly dubbing
