Pied Piper

Don Mills is MFFC's Very Own Fly Fishing Piper


Five years running, Don Mills, MFFC member, Scotsman, retired teacher, and competitive piper has performed as the opening ceremony of the Midwest Fly Fishing Expo including Saturday's event. Every year he plays a different musical selection.

"Long story short, my mom was going to Scotland to do family research. As mom's always do, she wanted to bring me back a souvenir. I didn't want a t-shirt. I told her I wanted a practice chanter from Scotland, so she went into a piping store in Glasgow and bought a chanter and a book," said Mills.



That evolved into the Cabar Feidh pipe band, where Mills was ranked pipe sergeant. "Then when our pipe major left, I was elected pipe major. I was pipe major for around 10 years."

"We started to evolve into a performance group (including parades), but I wanted to compete," said Mills. "Then in 2014, I retired from the band. It was too much trying to accomplish the piping thing and finish up my teaching career and raising kids."



He will be up there again this year, although competition was moved to Alma High School as the college is staging major building renovations. Mills' pipe band also has plans to compete in

Georgetown, ON, Kincardine, ON, then finish up the season at Detroit's St. Andrew's Games at Greenmeade in Livoina if you wish to see him perform.

His pipe dream is to participate in the World Championships in August. "It's usually in Glasgow," said Mills. During the

pandemic he and his wife live streamed the competition. Mills maternal lineage is the Gordan Clan, and on his paternal side, Scott Clan.

What does this all have to do with fly fishing?

"I met Bill Mangan on the Au Sable's Keystone Landing and started taking lessons from him," said Mills. "He's really good. I've helped him out at club events pre-COVID. It's a lot of fun."

MFFC. Bill Mangan. Casting. You can't go wrong with that combination.

"My brother fly fished for awhile. When I was 18, I fly fished for a couple of years. We actually have a really good friend that tied flies for Rusty Gates of Gates Lodge," said Mills. "He kinda helped me out a little bit. He lives up

by Marquette in a little town called Harvey. He took me to Frenchman's Pond and Robert Traverse's Camp, where I successfully caught a Brook trout."

"I still worm dunk on occasions. My brother and I canoe and catch trout on spinners. I do eat trout," said Mills. "I'm not a catch and release guy, well mostly I am, but I do keep a few here and there. Other than that, I try to fish on the Au Sable, going to different spots."

"My current goal is to camp streamside and fly fish the Pine River in Petoskey," said Mills. "I put up an EZ Up tent, and a cot and a good serious sleeping bag. It takes about an hour to set up my camp and I'm off to go fishing."

Mills confessed he would also like to fish out west. Recently retired, after five years of teaching second grade, 20 years of teaching fourth grade, and serving as both Union Rep and Union VP, he has more time to both pipe and fish.



All the Lakes & Streams I Need to Fish

I was lucky enough to receive a copy of Jerry Dennis' latest book *Up North in Michigan* for Christmas and must admit I read a lot of it in one day. The book is written in four segments about our four seasons. The first, "Spring," really spoke to me and made me think about that season.

All of us enjoy time on the water.

Whether we fish from a boat, the bank, or wade in the water, we all enjoy the sights and sounds of the waters we love. We can motorboat, sail, kayak, canoe or just wade.

We are so very fortunate to live in a place where no one owns the bottom of a river. We can wade rivers flowing through fields, yards, towns and cities.

Indeed a Google search returned the information that our State of Michigan has over 11,000 lakes and more than 51,438 miles of rivers and streams. Of these rivers and streams more than 656 miles are considered "wild and scenic."

We have more than 20,000 miles of trout streams, with about 850 miles being rated "quality" trout streams, based

on hatch quality, wade ability, wild trout population and history of quality fly fishing.

I have many wonderful memories of lakes fished in my float tube. One lake was designated as a "trout lake," but all the others had bass in many sizes along with happy bluegills, sunfish and other panfish. A couple of pike respond-

ed well to my flies and a couple of carp fell victim to them too. All in all, the fishing for warm-water species was superb.

Years ago, a group of us fished several summer evenings in Brighton and shared great times with much laughter and many, I mean *MANY*, wonderful catches.

I enjoyed sharing numerous lakes in the northern half of the Lower Peninsula with other club members. Between the laughter of hooked fish and the shared awe of the lovely scenery, I know I came away with memories that will last a lifetime.

One thing we learned is always to leave a light on the lakeshore to make it

easier to find where to return if we have so much fun we forget to leave before sunset.

A wonderful group of us used to fish the Huron River, out near Ann Arbor. Back then you could use a park on Tuesday evening without a park pass. We fished at different parks each week, then started over. The fishing was fun but the fishing stories, flies and laughter were the best part. The smallmouth bass fishing was so much fun we did it for quite a few years. The river is very wadable, the fish were friendly, and very happy to get back into their home river when released. Fishing there taught me to try many different flies, it also taught me that a 5-weight rod, no matter what it is made of, is a 5-weight rod. (Thank you John Long for that clarification.)

Every one of us can fly fish all over our state. We are fortunate to have many trout streams open all year long, with no closed season, allowing us to fish any time we want — and many of us have done just that.

Joyce and I had a pact we would fish at least once each month for the entire year. We have not fulfilled our pact for every month of last year, but we are talking about starting this month, to fish every month of 2022.

We calculated we fished about 50 miles of trout stream here in Michigan a while ago. Frankly, that number seemed small when we first came up with it. After all, I have been fly fishing for more than 35 years and Joyce about the same. In 35 years of wading and fly fishing, I would think I would have covered far more than 50 miles.

With some help from Google Earth and some Michigan county maps, we figured out the distances we waded on our fishing excursions. We found out most of the wades we do are truly much shorter than we thought. An old saying is that a fisherman never fishes the same river twice.

I agree and embrace the different things that make each wading trip different, but still, only 50 miles? If I included each trip as a new river, then the

mileage would multiply, but our figure was based on actual different river sections and wade lengths, not counting each specific encounter as another river. So maybe 50 miles is reasonable.

We discussed all of these notes and thoughts about our fishing numbers. It

seems we fish a lot; at other times, we are slackers. We probably fished about eight different lakes out of 11,000. Not very impressive. We fished about 50 miles of river out of 51,438 miles available. Again, not very impressive.

We patted ourselves on the back for 50 miles of quality trout stream out of 850 miles, but we both admit it's not

quite as much as we felt we needed to enjoy.

So, for this year, we plan to use our float tubes and kayaks more. We plan to fish more lakes for warm and cold-water species, and we sure plan to enjoy our bounty of quality trout streams more, with new wades for some exploration.

Anyone else up for some exploring?
