Sybil Hunter Steps Into New and Unprecedented Role for MFFC

What should we call Sybil Hunter? It used to be Hatch editor and still is, then corresponding secretary and vice president. Now Madame President? And what about Chris Hunter? First Husband?

Doesn't matter. What matters is that for the first time in the 52-year history of the Michigan Fly Fishing Club, the venerable organization is being led by a woman.

At the Opening Day Celebration on the grounds of Gates Au Sable Lodge, MFFC members were toasting Sybil's new title as much as they were remembering those who had passed on.

Sybil, who joined MFFC in 2000, took over as president in May from Bruce Strachan.

And Bill Zadorsky, one of the club's founding members, said it was about time a woman oversaw this group of fly anglers.

"I was there when the first two women joined the club," said Zadorsky while toasting Sybil on the banks of the Au Sable River. "That was in 1984, so this was long overdue."


Time to Celebrate Opening Day! We Can Fish Later

From Bluegills to the MFFC Presidency

It is with great reverence that I accept the position of President-Elect of the Michigan Fly Fishing Club in 2022.

At the Opening Day event, I had the pleasure of speaking to one of the founding fathers of our Club, Bill Zadorsky, a.k.a. "Zeke." He relayed to me tales of the early days of the Club.

There were stories about John Pinto, the first expos, chillin' and fishing with what are now nationally recognized speakers, including Lee and Joan Wolff. And an

array of fun, crazy outings they took... which included wheeling one of those said "nationally recognized speakers" to his upstairs hotel room strapped to a hand truck borrowed from the cleaning staff.

Thank you, Zeke for bringing me up to speed and keeping it all in perspective!

Frankly, I have no idea how we found the Michigan Fly Fishing Club. Perhaps it found us (the expo maybe?).

Chris and I joined around 2000

when Al Haxton finished his presidency, passing the mantle of leadership to Peter Albertson. This was the time when I returned to grad school to earn my teaching certificate. Chris attended more meetings than I did

because I was eyeball deep in calculus, programming, French, and linguistics.

I grew up fishing. My mother would put me on the back of her English bike, setting me in the metal popup child's seat behind her. We rode to the

other end of town to fish from the huge rocks lining Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay. On our trip home, I shared the seat with a stringer of fish we

would clean for that day's meals.

When I was older, I fished with my father and his father. My grandparents lived in a cabin in Harrison. Grandpa sent my sister and me out to dig up worms in the yard. My sister typically wandered off. Then we would pack into

Grandpa's duct-taped, olive green vehicle with vinyl bench seats with the windows down and head up to Roscommon to fish for dinner. Lunch was a bologna sandwich with butter and ketchup.

It was there I stabbed my first worm (it bled, poor thing) and caught my first bluegill.

"Oh just grab it, and pull the hook out," Dad said. "It's no big deal."

I still remember the stinging pain and bleeding from being pin-pricked across my entire left palm from that little bugger. After that, I pimped the privilege...batting my eyelids and giving my Dad puppy dog eyes, I would slog the Bluegill through the water for him to unhook. Perch - no problem. Bluegill - no dice.

When we got back to Harrison, my sister would help Dad clean the fish. (She especially liked to pluck the eyeballs out to play with them. Scaling the fish was fun too.) This time I wandered off. Grandma would send me to the garden to pick peas or beans to snap.

Let me tell you, Dad cooked fantas-

tic panfish and made the absolute best hushpuppies. I never liked any others better.

Christopher and I married in 1994 (yep, 28 years). Our first Christmas together, I unwrapped a pair of Orvis Women's neoprene waders, cut with a waist to make them stylish, a 5-weight Powell IM6, loaded reel, and felt-bottomed boots. I remember standing there in front of the fireplace in our flat giving him a long, hard, silent stare.

"It's better than a blender," Mom said on the phone that day. It was the start of my fly fishing adventures.

Ironically enough, I enjoyed driving over the border into Pennsylvania to fish the spring creeks at Slippery Rock - where I slipped on a rock, tearing my waders.

Chris stormed a nearby fly shop and came out with a new pair of waders that were "under warranty." I fell in next time as well but didn't bust my waders. Then fishing in Castalia where an arti-

cle the next month said women were incompetent therefore should not be allowed to fish there. (Chris was being an attentive new husband, netting my fish for me.)

Later he dragged me to MFFC Member's School. I greatly enjoyed that and remember happily tying with Jeff McGowan. Then Opening Day and Dam 4 a few years later - after which Chris told me to find a divorce attorney. What can I say? It's been a rocky road.

Tying and casting are still my favorites. Tracy Wallis, Chris and I hooked up with Al Haxton to learn to tie at Beuter's Fly Shop in Northville. That was a ton of fun for all of us! I experienced my first casting lesson with Bruce Richardson and loved it.
