Thanks to FFI Grant, MFFC Keeps Our Youth Tying

The holidays are behind us, and the new fishing season is months away. That can only mean it's time to tie flies.

The GLC-affiliated Michigan Fly Fishing Club (MFFC) celebrates that season this year by dusting off the vises and pulling out mounds of hooks, hackle, and thread to introduce the art of fly tying to children and teens.

Volunteer MFFC members again will be instructing boys and girls (and, on occasion) their parents at outdoors-oriented events in metro Detroit this winter.

This year's program of youth fly-tying events is supported by a grant from Fly Fishers International, an umbrella organization of more than 300 fly-angling organizations across the United States and around the world.

Also supporting the effort is Michigan State's Project F.I.S.H, which provides fishing education opportunities to interested adults and youth from Michigan's many diverse populations.

First was the Ultimate Fishing Show in mid-January at the Suburban Collection Showplace in Novi. Outdoorama follows Feb. 23-26, also at the Suburban Collection Showplace.

The MFFC-hosted Midwest Fly Fishing Expo, the oldest all-fly fishing show east of the Mississippi, is March 11-12

at the Macomb Community College Sports and Expo Center in Warren.

At the Expo's Kid's Korner young anglers can learn to tie flies, learn to cast a fly rod, or create a one-of-a-kind T-Shirt.

The MFFC's volunteer tyers have been hosting kids at these events for years.

"I joined the Club 18 years ago, and youth fly-tying is one of my favorite events," said Jim Aitken, who heads up the Club's youth fly-tying efforts.

"There's a real thrill helping kids learn how to tie a fly. Many come back year after year, and it's always great to hear how some have caught fish on a fly they tied."

2023 Expo Headliners Gather Around & Learn a Trick or Two

Tim Flagler Fly Tying Video Producer

Tim Flagler is the owner of Tightline Productions, a video production company located in Califon, NJ. Although he produces video programs over a wide range of topics, his specialty has become fly fishing.

Flagler is best known for taking fly-tying videos to a higher level by incorporating professional video production standards and techniques at his in-home studio.

He is also a prolific producer, uploading a new fly recipe or instructional video almost weekly. He estimates he has created "well over 600 videos" dedicated to fly fishing, the reason his YouTube channel, practical patterns.com, has more than 106,000 subscribers and 33 million views.

You can also hear his distinct voice on Midcurrent (mid-



current.com) and Trout Unlimited's national website, as well as on the Orvis Learning Center (howtoflyfish.orvis.com). In addition, he has a regular column, Beginner's Masterclass with Tim

Flagler, in Fly Tyer magazine, which selected Flagler as "Fly Tyer of the Year" in the Winter 2022 issue.

Many of Flagler's tying videos take the viewer well beyond just the tying of the fly and show what it looks like un-

derwater, what natural species it represents and how it can be fished.

Flagler and his wife, Joan, also enjoy guiding year-round for Shannon's Fly & Tackle and host annual trips to Patagonia in the spring and to the Kootenai River in MT in the summer. He'll be hosting trips to Iceland starting in the fall of 2023.

on-river knowledge to fellow anglers and has developed innovative strategies for sighting, hooking and landing selective trout.





toriously difficult trout. Naguski is a bug geek and loves to dry fly fish. To him, sharing the experience of successfully presenting a dry fly to a picky rising fish with a client is most often more fun than doing it himself.

Naguski has a biology degree in aquatic ecology and is heavily involved in conservation activities in the Cumberland Valley as a board member of Cumberland Valley TU. He also finds the time to serve on the board of the Pennsylvania Fly Fishing Muse-

um Association working to preserve and promote the storied history of fly fishing in Pennsylvania.

Naguski enjoys fly fishing for saltwater fish and has caught fish on the fly from Massachusetts to Mexico, but his heart lies in the limestone streams of Pennsylvania. His book, *Favorite Flies for Pennsylvania* (Stackpole 2021) highlights an all-around fly selection for Pennsylvania waters. Naguski has also contributed to Keystone State Fly Fishing, Fly Fisherman magazine and Hallowed Waters Journal.

for warmwater species, it's hard to find him anywhere but a smallmouth river from early spring to late fall. When he is not rowing a boat, he is most likely crawling around a local spring creek chasing picky wild fish.

In addition to guiding, Villwock is the author of *Small-mouth Bass Flies Top*



to Bottom, a Fulling Mills Signature tyer, blog-writer, contributor to Fly Fisherman and Eastern Fly Fishing magazines, and serves on various pro-staffs of leading industry companies such as Hatch Reels, Scientific Anglers, Simms Fishing, Clacka Craft Drift Boats, Scott Fly Rods, and Regal Vise. He lives in Carlisle, Pennsylvania.

One Liners & Two Flies An Evening with Jerry Regan

Put a piece of worm on that, and you'll catch fish," said Jerry Regan joking at January's tying demo, where three of his Tricos were displayed, jabbed into a rubber worm clipped to a fly display. A lifetime tyer, Regan entertained as he tied, keeping the audience in stitches with his one-liners.

"If you got a question, fine. If not, fine. I'll just keep tying anyway," he said to a laughing audience. "That's why I'm an only child. My Mom took one look at me and said...Done."

"Good enough!" Shouted someone from the back.

Regan grew up along the Au Sable River near Grayling and mastered fly tying and fishing from Michigan legends like Earl Madsen and Ernie Borcher. Today he is a prolific commercial tyer and a historian of the many flies that originated in Michigan.

Regan will be back as one of the guest tyers at the Midwest Fly Fishing Expo on March 11-12 at the Macomb Community College Sports and Expo Center. But MFFC members didn't wait for the Expo, packing Clarenceville Middle School for an entertaining evening with the legendary fly tyer.

During the entire presentation, Regan was tying, walking the audience through patterns the Hairy Drake and his Hex Spinner pattern.

"They got a lot of this thread that you can tow your car with," said Regan.

"Thinner thread keeps you from getting heavy-handed." He used 6/0 thread tied on thin, then tied in the tail. "You can't make a tail too long, but you sure can make it too short," said Regan. He uses floss for color because "It does not frav."

"I tie with my fingers. One thing about fingers is they don't fall off and get lost on the floor," said Regan.

He swears by polypropylene yarn. "Wool...chenille...try to keep that from sinking!" "

"I don't use a stacker," said Regan while tying in the deer hair that he aptly snipped off the hide on the table. "If I hear (a stacker being used), I holler out, 'Is there a woodpecker in here?'"

He also uses house lacquer, which he purchases by the gallon, to finish his flies.

Regan said to fish the Hairy Drake from the end of April into October Hex season is late June to early July.

"As soon as it gets dark, my favorite version of (the Hex Spinner is tied with) white deer hair, collared with white hackle, and white hen wings," said Regan. "People say, what do you think (the fish) see? I don't know, but I know what they see last!"

The audience laughed and then also ended the night seeing and admiring Regan's Hex Spinner.

More Expert Tyers & More Patterns to Learn at the Expo

John Satkowski

John Satkowski is a Toledo-based artist, commercial fly tyer, and fly tying instructor that focuses on the rivers and lakes of southeastern Michigan and northwest Ohio. John's trademark is the realistic flare of his patterns that is often achieved



by his use of creative fly materials and unconventional tying styles. John is a pro tyer for Flymen Fishing Company, and JS Stockard, and a Commercial Tyer for Rainy's flies with patterns ranging from dry flies to saltwater flies.

Glenn Weisner

Glenn Weisner is the owner of Glenn River Fly Co. in Sylvania, Ohio that specializes in "Tying Kits." Glenn was a friend of the late Chris Helm and attributes most of his tying capabilities to the information he has "stolen from Chris's warehouse of knowledge and experience." Glen can often be found fishing the trout streams of Pennsylvania,



Wisconsin and Michigan. He enjoys tying mostly trout flies for small streams and has created and improved several patterns that can be seen on website: www.glennriver.com.

TroutRoutes More Trout Streams Then You'll Ever Fish

Have you ever asked yourself, "Where's the closest trout stream?"

Zach Pope, founder of TroutRoutes has, and personally found, all 50,000 of them in the Lower 48. As well as mapping the streams, he included the contact information for every fly-fishing shop along them. And he finished by putting this wealth of information in one location -- Your cell phone.

Pope started this immense project by collecting public data from sources like OpenStreetMap.org and the National Hydrography Dataset from US Geological Surveys (usgs.gov).

Then he added the Geographic Information System (GIS) hydrological data from each state, Google Maps, personal map usage data, QGIS.org (an open source information system), images from Google Earth, and more, importing them to his computer as layers of information.

Realizing what an amazing collection of information he had collected for fly anglers, Pope continued to improve and tweak it and then packaged it in an app. Today the most extensive resources are available to the public via their smart phones and mobile devices.

The app includes real time flow rates along with elevation and color coded, current regulations for all 48 contiguous states. Zach has verified there are trout in each river within the app.

I had the privilege of interviewing him.



Zach Pope of TroutRoutes will again be a vendor demonstrating his mapping technology at the Midwest Fly Fishing Expo at the Macomb Community College Sports and Expo Center on March 11-12.

How do you verify there are trout in each river?

"We get asked that a lot. We work very closely with each state. In most states they have very thorough GIS sites. We actually work with the local agencies" getting additional information. However, "For example, South Dakota has nothing regarding trout, in

that case I've been there a bunch of times to manually enter the information to the layers (of the software)."

Is there stocking information?

"There are quite a few states that have stocking information in their systems. One that comes to mind is Pennsylania. When it is available, we display that to the user." For Michigan, the app includes all the regulations and state classifications. "The long-term vision is to show anything related to trout."

The onWater app says they recently added more streams. Now what?

"They are a higher-level product. We've taken a more comprehensive approach...to truly understand where the trout are," said Pope. "onWater displays the top 50 versus the actual 50,000 available trout streams within the state of Michigan. There is so much more available."

Why is TroutRoutes sexy?

"It is every trout stream. It is all the regulations. It is all the public access, and it is every access point you could ever be able to find," said Pope.

"What it is not? It is not social hot spotting. It is not user data."

The Grayling Township Board of Trustees pass a resolution stating they "cannot support the expansion at this time."




A letter to Shannon Lotts, DNR Director

Renaissance Man Charlie Weaver Loved Fishing & Everything in Nature

Charlie Weaver died at home last week after 80 years of a life fully-lived.

Born in Washington DC in 1942, Charlie grew up in Pennsylvania, lived for some years in Ann Arbor and a short time in western Canada, before moving to northern Michigan near Grayling to what became his permanent residence near his beloved Manistee River.

During his time in Ann Arbor, Charlie taught Special Education. He loved to teach and loved his students, but couldn't abide the paperwork and administration, prompting him to change careers; he moved north and became a fly-fishing guide.

He worked daily from the stern seat of the area's endemic Au Sable River Boats, guiding anglers from all over the world in search of wild trout on both the Manistee and the Au Sable Rivers.

Charlie was a true naturalist; indeed, one long-time friend describes him as a North Woods Renaissance Man. In addition to his love of fishing, he was an incredibly accomplished birder. His last known life list included as many as 950 species worldwide and 355 species in Michigan, placing him 55th on the eBirds top 100 birders in the state.

He was an accomplished arborist who knew every tree in the woods. And though he didn't hunt, he was a championship marksman in high school.

Not surprisingly, Charlie was a noted advocate for the environment through his efforts in stream improvement, water quality studies, and conservation.

He was a valued member and contributor to the Sierra Club. Throughout his life, he defended best those people, creatures and special places that couldn't defend themselves.

He loved to travel, often to see new birds or fish new streams. He visited New Zealand many times, as well as Australia and made many trips to Mexand Central America.

Many will remember Charlie for his musicianship. He had a remarkably beautiful, strong, resonant, deep voice and played a number of instruments well. Though he mostly interpreted the music of others, he did write one song to protest the Line 5 pipeline.

He was also identified with Jim O'Dell, the "local ne'er-do-well" character in his friend Jay Stielstra's musical play, North Country Opera. Prior to the play's most recent tour in October, Charlie had played the role in all but one production over four decades.

As O'Dell, Charlie sang the play's iconic song, with lyrics that feel appropriate to the man as well as the character: Hand me down my fly rod, hand me down my gun Dress me in my waders when

my days on earth are done. Dump me in some corner in Northern Michigan And wrap my stiffened fingers 'round a Pabst Blue Ribbon can. Oh, that will be Heaven for Me! Buried in the North Land, in God's country!

Cremation has taken place. A gathering of Charlie's friends will be scheduled for this spring on the banks of the Au Sable. Charlie's forward-thinking instructions for this occasion were simple: "Good acoustic music, and no drums!"

A Fly Named Lou's Blue

In 1922, fly tyer Leonard Halladay was asked to create a mayfly pattern his friend saw hatching on Mayfield Millpond. Halladay did and named it after that friend, Charles Adams.

Today the Adams is the most recognized fly



in Michigan. Mary Lou Rogala is hoping for the same fate in Colorado.

Last fall Rogala's friend, Jonathan Antunez of Westminster, just outside of Denver, created a blue-wing ol-

ive pattern he named after her; Lou's Blue. The next day they went fishing on the South Platte River at Deckers and the MFFC member was the first angler to catch a trout on it.

"I was very honored," said Rogala. "I met Mary Lou Rogala and her trout.

On his Facebook page, Antunez wrote that the "simple spider-like pattern excels when used with a long rod. I work this fly on a downstream swing, sometimes gently jigging, lightly tapping, or just let it slow swing near seams where BWO like to hatch."

abounds, that Zach responds daily to social media accusations of hot spotting (providing GPS coordinates online showing the location of a specific fishing run). "I think the fly fishing industry is unique, in that there are a lot of hot topics within the industry."

Tell me about the fly shops in the app.

"After speaking in Michigan, I spent the next day visiting all the fly fishing shops in the area. There is a 950 shop curated list of all the fly shops in the country on TroutRoutes. There is a link to each shop. We even make some of them custom icons."

Do you do a lot of windshield time?

Pope laughed. "It was just me up until July 2021. It's been a pretty wild couple of months since then.

"I now have a team of eight...half of them are in mapping and half are in sales and marketing. I originally planned to drive from location to location but going from New Jersey to California in a short time is unrealistic."

When I caught up with Pope, he was pacing the floor of a Best Buy looking for a replacement display monitor – his last one was crushed in his luggage by the airline grounds crew. "My next stop is Target, to get a blanket to wrap it in." Thus go the unique problems of owning your own business.

Does your family join you?

"My wife is a nurse. We have three kids – two, plus one on the way due in August!" said Pope. "My family will join me in California, New Jersey and maybe Michigan."

Then when your little one is born?

"I hope to take off a few months to camp and fish with the family. It's better than any corporate job."

"It's the busy season."

Pope will be in Boston few days, next Idaho, New Jersey on January 27th, and on until our Midwest Fly Fishing Expo March 11-12. Please stop by at Pope's booth when you get there and check out what TroutRoutes has to offer.
