The club's resurrection of the 2<sup>nd</sup> year on "Non-Meeting Wednesdays on the Water" with the "Summer Tour of 2025" has come to an end. This is hard to believe as it seems we just started these awesome nights out fishing. This 2<sup>nd</sup> year was a success even though Mother Nature decided to throw us some of the worst conditions to fish in as in high winds, rain, high fronts coming through, and severe storms.

We started out his year on **Bishop Lake in Brighton State Rec Area** and we caught fish, but dealing with high winds and waves. I was fortunate enough to see John Aukee catch 2 nice bass in the back lake in the high winds and waves. I went up to the front lake by the Fishing Pier with John Erikson and it was a blast with huge panfish by the fishing pier. At one point I was doing a presentation with everyone on the fishing pier (including DNR) on using a fly rod for panfish before John joined me fishing. From there we went to **Newburgh Lake** and Mother Nature once more decided to really mess with us. When Ken and I got there, it was downpouring; once the rain became a light downpour, we headed out to fish, and it was a blast. Mother Nature couldn't keep us down; we were catching bass like crazy in the rain!! I think she decided, try and see if you like this: the rain stopped; that is when the heat was turned up with all bright sun. Everyone that was there was now catching bass and panfish. This lake is pretty unique as 70% of the lake is 6 foot or less, which means warmer waters. With the water (at the bottom) being 89 degrees, toss in the 2 weed cutters, and the weed chemicals being dumped in this system; it was a unique fishing experience, but we still caught fish. Plus, once again she (Mother Nature) had severe storms all around us, but the rain didn't happen until on our way home. We went back down river this time, down to **Gallup Park** in Ann Arbor. This was just a plain hot day, but we caught fish and Ken for sure rocked this trip with an excellent smallmouth.





Then we fished the last part of the **Huron River at Point Mouillee** which is the final push of the Huron River. Fish were caught but Mother Nature decided to have a High-Pressure Point come through with northwest winds which basically shut everything down. ### Float Trip on the Madison

While in Montana my partner Angelo Zervos and I took a float trip on the Madison River on our last day of the trip, Friday. We met our guide Jordan at 8am at Kelly Galloup's Slide Inn fly shop. While Jordan picked out our flies for the day, I bought myself a new "Lucky" hat.

We pushed off at the "Linn" launch near the Rest Area about 8:45 and went just below the bridge and anchored so Jordan could give Angelo the low down about casting. It was his first trip in a boat. Jordan was a much better teacher than I had been in the previous days. She had him casting in no time. She rigged us up with two fly rigs with an indicator (bobber)point fly was a Flashback nymph size 18 and a top fly was a big black and sparkle streamer called a Black meat snack. All the fish are super tight to the banks so it was fish left fish right fish left side.



Suddenly my bobber was gone. I lifted my rod and strip set and found myself attached to a very active large trout. Got my line under control and fought the fish he ran twice when he got close to the boat . Finally, Jordan slipped the net under the fish, and we had him. When I finally stopped screaming, I found myself staring at the biggest brown trout I have ever landed on a fly rod. The new "Lucky hat" paid off in spades.

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### Conservation News and Stories from Recent Club Outings and Events



Study of invasive mussels finds PFAS is nearly everywhere in the Great Lakes (by Emilio Perez Ibarguen, from Bridge MI)

- 'Forever chemicals' were found in mussel tissues at 106 out of 120 sampling sites across the Great Lakes
- The highest average PFAS concentration was in Lake Michigan mussels, followed by the Niagara River, Lake Erie, Lake Ontario and the Detroit River
- Newer PFAS alternatives in the lakes represent an 'impending storm,' one researcher said.

Every summer throughout the mid 2010s, researchers scoured the Great Lakes in search of PFAS contamination. They took tissue samples from invasive mussels that have spread across the lakes near wastewater treatment plants, in rivers feeding into the lakes and from sites further offshore. They took samples from 120 sites in total. Results: scientists found PFAS nearly everywhere.

Those findings — published late last year by researchers at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the National Centers for Coastal Ocean Sciences — are another indicator of how ubiquitous so-called "forever chemicals" have become in the environment. PFAS, or per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, have been linked to cancer, thyroid problems and other health challenges.

While scientists have documented the substances in organisms near the bottom of the food chain, like mussels, before, this report provides the clearest picture yet of the magnitude and spatial distribution of the toxic compounds in the lakes.



The report combined data from various studies in the Great Lakes under the National Mussel Watch Program, which has tracked contaminants in the lakes since 1992. The program didn't start tracking PFAS, however, until 2013. Mussels in Lake Michigan had the highest average concentration of PFAS, followed by sites sampled in the Niagara River, Lake Erie, Lake Ontario and the Detroit River.

Newer PFAS compounds meant to replace phased-out chemicals in manufacturing are appearing in greater numbers and could reach harmful levels sometime soon, the report found. Although these so-called "short-chained" compounds aren't as heavily regulated as other PFAS, some evidence suggests they can persist in the environment for longer. "There is an impending storm of these short-chained components," said Michael Edwards, a physical scientist at NOAA and one of the report's authors. "Now there's a need to be ahead of that storm, to do more monitoring, to do more assessments."

### 2025 Alaska Trip Summary

Our annual self-guided Yakutat, Alaska trip has generated a lot of interest. This year (July 24 - August 2) Jay Labban, MFFC member, and I were joined by others from Michigan, Iowa, Montana and Texas who heard about the great Pink Salmon fishing on the Situk River. Four years ago, we were 6 fishermen, this year we grew to 11! Wading was easy as the river bottom is mostly small gravel and sand. And as long as you did not delay too long on the wrong side of the river when the tide came in!

The Pinks were plentiful with an occasional Sockeye or Dolly Varden. One photo shows the normal size of the Pinks we caught and the other picture is the largest Pink caught on this trip. Most used a fly rod with an occasional spinning rod.



Some of the group went on an off-shore charter returning with impressive catches of Rock Fish and Halibut. One of our group caught a large King Salmon on a fly which was immediately released as he did not have the required King Salmon stamp on his license. Some of the fishermen took home up to 50 pounds of Pink Salmon.

We are often asked about bears. While we often saw bear scat and prints as shown in the attached photo there was only one brief sighting when a black bear ran across the road in front of the van.





Transportation takes two days with an overnight in Seattle, Anchorage or Juneau depending on the airline and route selected. Not including elective excursions such as an ocean charter, a helicopter or fixed-wing sight-seeing flight or a guided day-long float on the Situk the per-person cost for airline, over-night, lodging, food, drinks, license, van and van gas was less than \$3,000.

## **PFAS is nearly everywhere in the Great Lakes** (continued from Page 5

The results have worrying implications for the Great Lakes, which hold 21% of the world's surface freshwater, support a \$7 billion dollar fishing industry and provide drinking water for more than 30 million people.

PFAS compounds have many channels to enter the environment. They are found in a wide array of products, ranging from nonstick cookware and stain-resistant carpet to firefighting foam and automobiles. Past research shows that much of the contamination is literally raining down on the Great Lakes.

The researchers also found PFAS in mussels sampled from undeveloped areas, although the highest levels were detected adjacent to developed land and industry. Contamination wasn't as high near municipal wastewater treatment plants which are required to limit discharge of some types of PFAS. A spokesperson for the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy told Bridge Michigan that, although the agency has detected PFAS in the Great Lakes, no water supply

relying on them has been out of compliance with Michigan's PFAS limit since they went into effect in August 2020. "However, more work needs to be done by the state to encourage industry to find safe alternatives to PFAS in manufacturing", said Erica Bloom, toxic campaigns director at the Ann Arborbased Ecology Center. Bloom added that contamination in the Great Lakes rarely stays contained in their waters. PFASconcentrated white foam has been washing up on the shores of the Great Lakes in recent years and forms in inland lakes, rivers and streams across the state. Michigan also tripled the number of waterbodies where it says fish are no longer safe to eat due to PFAS contamination.

Tony Spaniola, who owns a home in the PFAS-polluted community of Oscoda and co-chairs the Great Lakes PFAS Action Network, said he wishes EGLE would do more about contamination in Lake Huron, though recognized that the agency is stretched thin addressing such widespread contamination. Oscoda residents struggled to grab EGLE's attention about the beach foam, eventually conducting their own tests that showed high levels of PFAS.

It's likely that any community dealing with a similar problem, Spaniola said, would need to be vocal about the contamination in their community.

"People in the community have to make their voices heard with the agency to let them know they have a problem," he said.


